2.0 Business

2.1 Update on Recent Caribou and Wolf Monitoring – Collaring, Spring Recruitment, Fall Composition

Fall Composition Survey tells us about summer calf survival and provides the bull:cow ratio, which helps us understand the overall health of the herd and extrapolate herd size. The survey was conducted on October 17-25, 2022 and November 1-3, 2022, with the peak of rut about October 20. For the Sahtì Ekwò, there 2884 caribou classified with a 52.3:100 calf:cow ratio and a 64.8:100 bull:cow ratio. For the Beverly Ekwò, there were 6369 caribou classified with a 46.5:100 calf:cow ratio and 62.8:100 bull:cow ratio. For the Kòk'èetì Ekwò, due to significant mixing, the calf:cow ratio was 38.4:100 and the bull:cow ratio was 105.6:100. Survey is conducted by helicopter by looking for groups of caribou. Small groups are classified (bull, cow, calf) from the air. With large groups, the helicopter lands and caribou are classified from the ground.

Kòk'èetì and Sahtì Ekwò Spring Recruitment Survey tells us about calf survival. In March 2023, 9917 caribou were classified. However, the herds were very mixed and so it will be a challenge to get herd specific information. Survey results are not yet available.

<u>Dìga Collaring</u> was in March 2023 with 4 females and 2 males collared (added two collars to new pack, added two collars to existing packs, and added two new collars to existing packs that have collars dropping soon). Dìga fell to sleep in 4-6 minutes, handled for about 25-30 minutes, wake up time about 4-6 minutes. <u>Dìga Harvesting</u> has a total of 118 carcasses submitted to ECC from the incentive zone. This was a mix from Tłįchǫ Government, Kugluktuk, winter road harvesters, and outfitters.

Kộk'èetì and Sahtì Ekwò Collaring occurred in March 2023. All collars were put out as follows: Kộk'èetì Ekwò – 39 female, 15 male; Sahtì Ekwò – 22 female, 15

male; Beverly Ekwò – 23 female, 16 male. ECC won't know until calving whether targets were met.

<u>Sahtì Ekwò</u> Population Survey will be happening June 2-11, 2023, based out of Kugluktuk, NT. Aimee Guile to participate on behalf of the WRRB.

Board discussion included: i) possible Tłįchǫ name for Beverly Caribou (Łìhtsok'è gokwǫ (Łutsel K'è Ekwǫ), suggestion to check with Tłįchǫ Government or communities to determine if appropriate term, looking for an easier term for Tłįchǫ elders to understand which caribou are being discussed, important for possible future discussions with Łutsel K'è about Kǫk'èetì and Beverly Ekwǫ; ii) develop a better way to explain calf:cow ratio, suggestion to use money as elders do not think in percentages, seeing upward trend for the Sahtì Ekwǫ calf:cow ratio, but not for the Kǫk'èetì Ekwǫ.

2.2 Review & Approval of Bathurst Caribou Advisory Committee's 2023 Proposed Status and Action Plan

The Annual Review of Bathurst Caribou Herd – 2023 Action Plan summarizes the presentations and discussions that were had at the 2nd Annual Review Meeting in January 2023. In 2022, the estimated population was 6,851 individuals (95% CI: 3,895–12,050). This is significantly below the threshold of 30,000 individuals that would move the herd's status into the next category. While there were some positive observations reported in both the community and scientific presentations, the population estimate combined with community reports of limited numbers of caribou, led the Bathurst Caribou Advisory Committee (BCAC) to designate the Bathurst herd status as "Critical Low".

Based on this status the working group recommended a suite of management actions on harvest, predators, research and monitoring, habitat and disturbance, and communication and education.

Board discussions included: concern about level of disturbance on the range, particularly helicopters; concern about climate change and the impacts on caribou; concerns about forest fires/flooding and impact on food availability for caribou, do not let the green burn; suggestion to slow down harvest for 2-3 years (hunt via skidoo only, no trucks, no winter road harvesting).

The WMMP was posted to the WRRB's Management Proposals website page on April 13, 2023 and open for comments until May 15, 2023. No comments were received. No significant changes between Version 5.1 and 6.1.

2.4 Review & Approval of Commercial Timber Cutting Permits – Tanner Monckton-Milnes, Jeffrey Bell, John Rocher

Three commercial timber cutting permit applications have been submitted for May 2023 to May 2024.

- Tanner Moncton-Milnes has applied to cut up to 150 cords of dead spruce/pine fuelwood from kms 140-170 and kms 190-200 on Highway #3.
- John Rocher has applied to cut up to 60 cords of dead spruce/pine fuelwood from kms 185-188 of Highway #3.
- Jeffrey Bell has applied to cut up to 50 cords of dead spruce/pine fuelwood from kms 140-210 on Highway #3.

Board discussions included: concern about overlapping kilometers for cutting, woodcutters have to sort out the area where they will harvest, permit does not give rights to any areas/land.

2.5 Review & Approval of Bat Acoustic Recording Unit (ARU) Proposal

A multi-species management plan exists for all bats in the Northwest Territories, The Management Plan for Bats in the NWT outlines management approaches to meet objectives which have been agreed upon by management authorities. The WRRB approved this plan in 2019 and agreed to a number of actions.

Currently the Government of the Northwest Territories, Department of Environment and Climate Change (ECC) runs the "Bat Monitoring in the Northwest Territories" program, deploying acoustic recording units (ARU) to non-invasively monitor for the presence of the eight different bat species found in the NWT. ECC carries an active Wildlife Research Permit (WRP) for this work, and the WRRB has supported their WRP applications. There are no ARUs for bat monitoring currently located on the new Tłįchǫ Highway to Whatì.

ECC, in conjunction with the Wildlife Conservation Society, is also running a Bats and Bridges project to check bridges for bat guano and collect it into an envelope with a shovel if it is found. This work contributes to the GNWT white-nose syndrome surveillance program and provides information on bat species distribution and use of bridges in the region.

WRRB Staff are proposing funding, managing, and completing the field work for a Bat Acoustic Program, run under the active WRP held by ECC. ECC are interested in the WRRB adding ARU stations to their program. WRRB staff have communicated with Tłįchǫ Government, Tłįchǫ Research and Training Institute, who have indicated that they would support the work and could have their monitors complete the field work with WRRB staff and check on the ARUs. The proposed budget is \$7412.48.

From Species at Risk consultations in 2017, the Tłįchǫ term for bat is *dlį̇ą k'et'aa* (flying mouse).

2.6 Review & Approval of Wildlife Research Permit Application – Migratory connectivity, contaminant exposure, demographics, diet, and behaviour of boreal treeline passerines during the breeding and migration seasons

Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC), Canadian Wildlife Service has submitted a Wildlife Research Permit (WRP) Application titled "Migratory connectivity, contaminant exposure, demographics, diet, and behavior of boreal treeline passerines during the breeding and migration seasons". This is a new project. The application is for work occurring over ten days between July 1-15, 2023.

The WRP application requests support to: 1) Set up a motus tower (bird tracking tower) at two sites on the Tibbitt to Contwoyto Winter Road (one by the Lockhart Camp and one by Mackay Lodge); 2) Capture a maximum of 300 breeding birds and fit metal and colour bands on their legs; 3) Birds will be captured in a grid of approximately 20 mist nets; 4) Take physical measurements of the birds, collect fecal and blood samples from 20 individuals from 4 species; and 5) Fit radio transmitters to this subset of 20 individuals from 3 species and 30 Harris's Sparrow (more urgent need for info on this SAR).

This research would provide valuable information on several species that have undergone steep declines over the last 50 years and are expected to be impacted further by climate change. Harris's Sparrow is a species of Special Concern under SARA, COSEWIC has scheduled Grey-cheeked Thrush for a status report preparation for November 2023, and Blackpoll Warbler and American Tree Sparrow are on the candidate assessment lists as mid-priority and low-priority, respectively. This work would also occur on the theoretical all-season road to Nunavut, making it potentially beneficial as baseline information for that project.

2.7 Review & Approval of COSEWIC Designation for Horned Grebe

The Canadian population of Horned Grebe is estimated to comprise 200,000 to 500,000 mature individuals. Range-wide population trend information is not conclusive. The Breeding Bird Survey of the southern breeding range estimates a 57% decline over the last 49 years. eBird data shows a 3-generation decline of over 30% across the winter range. In contrast, the Christmas Bird Count estimates an increase of 21% over the last 51 years.

Permanent loss of wetlands to agriculture and development threatens the Horned Grebe. Up to 70% of wetlands within the Prairie Region have disappeared since European settlement, with some loss ongoing. Temporary drying of wetlands during droughts can also displace Horned Grebe. Oil spills on the wintering grounds can also negatively impact the population.

On March 24, 2023, the WRRB provided an in-principal support of the special concern designation. If listed as *Special Concern* under SARA, a management plan will be required.

No plans to plant new trees along this highway, talks to plant test plots after fires to improve Todzı habitat, plan for now is for the forest to regenerate on its own; TG conducting dust study in Whatì, can be used for baseline for Gamètì and Wekweètì.

Submerged gill net, 52 geo-trackers deployed, catch and retrieve birds, only got five back, must catch birds to download data; collect eggs, find nests, use yolks for the contaminant study, kept shells to look at thinning; Tłįchǫ name nǫhtà tsoa, diving bird, called it the "map" as would follow the bird by boat from one pond to another; animals that live in the water know the water, if anything wrong, they know it, this may be why we don't see as many birds in agricultural areas due contamination; concerns about Avian Influenza, one seagull at YK, couple of ravens from Ft. Simpson.

Inuit hunters are tenacious, drive skidoo fast and go into areas that Tłicho harvesters wouldn't necessarily go; trying to help wildlife today, what is happening, is it because of transportation uses (airplanes, skidoos), other people south of the lake who are harvesting, not following our own rules, mines and roads, all the available routes, try to help caribou by removing wolves, what is it that we can do to make our numbers better?; we need to be monitoring more than we are now and better, always used wildlife to sustain us, started great program BOTG, researching everything about caribou behaviour, what it eats, should be thriving and should be very powerful, need to get more knowledge from out on the land to know what is happening out on the land, we need to use people that people will listen to; can we observe caribou for two years without using airplanes, helicopters, skidoos, vehicles, can harvest only in traditional ways?; need to let leadership know what is going on to fix things, lots of wastage and wounding, we need to hunt for less caribou, need to let our community members know, need to talk about our vision, what kind of solutions can be found, not one person can solve a problem, need many people working together, need to put our good ideas together; incorporated the school into the BOTG and on winter road monitoring this year, talking to principal about incorporating harvest techniques into the school.

Board discussion included: numbers on calendar should be bigger,12 Tłįchǫ months should be listed and associated with wildlife (possible 2025 calendar); bring Board Members & Staff to the schools during community board meetings.

6.0 Other Items

6.1 Round Table

Board Members thanked one another, interpreters, and staff for a good, positive meeting. Members noted: the importance for elders and older harvesters to share their knowledge so that the younger generation can continue to manage the animals, fish, land, and water into the future; the importance to have more information about the impacts of climate change; and the importance of clear communication with communities about our work.
