Diga (Wolf) Management Action Extension

The Tłįcho Government (TG) considers continuing dìga harvesting an important contribution to supporting the recovery of Sahtì (Bluenose-East) and Koʻk'eetì (Bathurst) ekwo. For the 2025 winter harvesting season, TG submitted a one-year Management Proposal for Community-Based Dìga Harvest, which was subsequently approved by the Wek'eezhìi Renewable Resources Board (WRRB).

The Management Proposal for Community-Based Diga Harvest is set to expire on January 1, 2026. To continue implementing the program for this coming winter, TG is requesting to extend the implementation of the Management Proposal for Diga until June 1, 2026.

TG held a Caribou Gathering in May 2025; delegates at that gathering included Tłįchǫ elders and harvesters who recommended to continue implementing the Community-Based Dìga Harvesting Program. Considering that TG has been implementing this program for six years, a concern was that if we stop harvesting dìga now their numbers would increase as dìga population reproduces rapidly. Also, the Community-Based Dìga Harvest Program provides a key opportunity for Tłįchǫ to develop dìga hunting and trapping skills and teach younger harvesters.

TG has taken a lead role to help in the recovery of the ekwỳ herds that we rely on, including dìga harvesting over the last six years. Actions to reduce the number of dìga on the winter ranges of the Sahtì (Bluenose-East) and Kỳk'èetì (Bathurst) ekwỳ, combined with ongoing harvest restrictions, are aimed to improve ekwỳ survival and promote recovery for both herds. The proposed goal of TG's Community-Based Dìga Harvest Program is to annually reduce the number of dìga on the winter ranges of Sahtì and Kỳk'èetì ekwỳ herds. Throughout the six years of running the Dìga Harvesting Program, we have harvested a total of 126 dìga (Table 1). The GNWT-ECC and TG plan on submitting Joint Management Proposals for the two herds in later in 2026, prior to the submission TG plans to consult with the Tłįchǫ communities to identify priority objectives that will hope to help the recovery of the herds. TG will include in the Joint Management Proposals to continue their Community-Based Dìga Harvest Program in the Joint Management Proposals for the Sahtì (Bluenose-East) and Kỳk'èetì (Bathurst) ekwỳ if the Tłįchǫ elders and harvesters advise to do so. Hence, the request to extend this current proposal for 6-months.

Table 1 shows Tłįcho efforts in harvesting diga, 2019 - 2025.

Continuing Traditional Diga Harvesting Practices

For the upcoming winter season (January to April 2026), TG plans to continue the Dìga Harvesting program activities, focusing on the area around Mackay Lake. These efforts align with the cultural importance of maintaining the balance between dìga and ekwò, ensuring that the herds can thrive for future generations. As part of this initiative:

- We will apply traditional tracking methods to identify diga activity around Wekweèti, and if there are available harvesters, we will make effort to hunt in that area for diga
- A team of 3-4 hunters will be based on Mackay Lake and will apply traditional tracking methods to identify diga activity as well as use the knowledge from the ekwò hunters.
 - The crew will continue harvesting efforts for 7-10 days.
 - o If harvesting is successful, we will send out a second crew for another 7-10 days.
 - o Harvesting techniques used will be based on shooting with a rifle.
 - o The hunters will be lodged at the True North Safaris Lodge.
 - Hunting efforts will be made by day trips from the lodge.

Concluding remarks

TG remains committed to working together with all co-management partners across the NWT and Nunavut to support recovery of the ekwò herds. TG will continue to share updates about our Management Actions with co-management partners, and to the WRRB after the upcoming winter harvesting season

TG thanks the WRRB for their on-going commitment to co-management and look forward to receiving the Board's response and recommendation.
