The Department Environment and Natural Resources (ENR) has maintained a steady relationship with the Northwest Territories (NWT) Barren-ground Outfitters Association, engaging in annual meetings to discuss operational issues, responding to questions and requests, and participating in topic-specific meetings. In addition to this, and in an attempt to address the ongoing debate around the collection and interpretation of barren-ground caribou data, the Minister of ENR committed to an independent peer review in January 2008.

This review was conducted by the Alberta Research Council (ARC). It assessed ENR's definition of barren-ground caribou herds and the techniques used to count and assess trends in the NWT. The terms of reference for the review were provided to the NWT Barren-ground Caribou Outfitters' Association in February 2008 and comments were incorporated. Members of the Association, as well as their consultant, Mr. Mark Fraker, met with the ARC and appeared satisfied that a thorough review would be conducted. Several association members indicated they would accept the results of this independent peer review.

The recently released ARC report identifies that:

- Defining caribou herds by calving ground affiliation is consistent with current practice;
- ENR's caribou survey methods have been consistent with common practice;
- Existing data supports a decline in the Bathurst, Bluenose-East, Bluenose-West and Cape Bathurst herds; and
- Managing these herds on the basis of decline is a sound precautionary conservation measure.

The ARC report also made numerous recommendations, including:

- Substantially increase collaring efforts for all caribou herds;
- Creating a standardized, regularly scheduled monitoring program to improve long-term planning and reporting on caribou research;
- Increasing the focus on obtaining demographic data on caribou herds;
- Incorporating population modeling into caribou management programs;
- Providing internal or external peer reviews for all survey reports;
- Publicly reporting survey and research results immediately and transparently;

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
- Developing a Territory-wide, consistent and strategic approach to ENR's caribou research program with centralized coordination;
- Formulating caribou management decisions within an adaptive management framework;
- Forming partnerships to increase resources dedicated to caribou research.

The Minister of ENR has accepted the ARC report and has made a public commitment to act upon its findings and recommendations.

While the Department plans to incorporate the recommendations of the ARC review, our work must not stop there. Over the upcoming summer months, ENR will be undertaking additional herd surveys and will be reviewing results with co-management partners in the fall of 2009. In addition, the Department will work with the Tłıchǫ Government to develop a joint proposal on management options for consideration by the Wek'èezhli Renewable Resources Board (WRRB). ENR anticipates this proposal will be ready by the fall of 2009. Barring a drastic need for action, any future changes to the number of tags available for outfitted hunts of caribou will take into consideration any recommendations and decisions made by the WRRB. Finally, and in attempt to provide Unit R Outfitters with market security, ENR will maintain the current allocation of 750 tags for outfitted hunts in Unit R until the 2010 hunting season.

We believe these actions and plans show the Departments commitment to, and support of, the NWT Barren-ground Outfitters' Association. We also believe that with the ARC report completed, we can move forward and develop actions aimed at ensuring the long-term sustainability of this resource. The Department of Environment and Natural Resources stands ready to undertake this work and hopes that all members of the NWT Barrenground Outfitters Association will work with us towards that goal.




Bathurst Barren Ground Caribou and Outfitting

As you are aware, the preliminary results of the most recent survey data for the Bathurst Barren Ground Caribou herd showed a steady and rapid decline to what is considered critical levels (32,000 animals). For the past 2 years and more urgently in the last 2 months, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (ENR) and the Tlicho Government have been working on a joint management proposal for the Wek'eezhii Renewable Resources Board (WRRB) as is required by the Tlicho Land Claim and Self Government Agreement. This proposal is scheduled for delivery to the WRRB by the end of October 2009. It is open to the WRRB to call for public hearings in response to this proposal, and if so, you may wish to make a formal presentation or provide submissions.

While preparing the proposal, ENR held a number of community meetings and workshops. During these meetings, as well as the recent Dene Nation meeting held in Dettah this past week, ENR heard a consistent message requesting the Minister to eliminate all outfitting tags for barren ground caribou in Unit R.

At our July 23, 2009 meeting between ENR and the outfitters, I indicated that the elimination of all outfitting tags for barren ground caribou in Unit R was a possible outcome. While the final recommendation has yet to be delivered by the WRRB to the Minister, it is clear from the steady and rapid decline of the herd that the Minister will have to limit harvesting. Based on this, I am recommending that all Unit R outfitters exercise caution in accepting reservations for outfitted hunts for the 2010 season until the WRRB has provided its recommendations and the Minister has made a final decision.





Information Request – Bathurst Caribou Monitoring Reports

Thank you for your recent request for information on recent Bathurst caribou monitoring and reports. We understand the importance of Wek'èezhii Renewable Resources Board (WRRB), having all available information for the Bathurst herd, given its current status. However, it may be difficult to meet your September 30, 2009 deadline as some of the material, such as modeling the most recent decline of the herd, is still in progress. Mr. John Boulanger has been contracted to carry out a number of follow-up analyses, but a number of those analyses will not be done until we have the final population estimate for the June 2009 survey. That requires the calving ground photos to be counted, and we do not yet have those results. We will make available as much of the material you requested as possible by September 30, 2009 and at that time we will, as you requested, provide an update on any remaining material and when it will be available.

In addition, I would like to point out there is a technical meeting scheduled for September 26 - 27, 2009 in Calgary, Alberta, to which Ms. Karen Clark, the WRRB Management Biologist, has been invited. The intent of this meeting is to review the available information on the herd's decline, including the follow-up analyses Mr. Boulanger is carrying out. We will use the meeting to work toward a peer reviewed technical report that will contain a substantial portion of the information requested in your letter. We will make that report available as soon as it is completed. Environment and Natural Resources staff will compile, analyze and write summary reports covering the other topics you inquired about.
